



### From the President's Corner

ARRL 10 Meter Contest 2010 results - WOW!! On the heels of several years of miserable propagation, Mother Nature dealt us a blackjack! The FCG ran away from the field and took a number of top spots in our categories!

Who needs sunspots?! This sunspot cycle is incredibly slow to rise. With a Solar Flux that is still under 100 most of the time, that is not a formula for extended 10M openings, but I still have a suspicion that 10M will be great for all 3 CQWW weekends this fall.

FQP 2010 – Absolutely horrible conditions (and an unusually high love bug count!) for that weekend, yet FCG activity still made this a successful weekend, along with a great cast of mobiles and non-"contesters" who just enjoy the QSO Party format.

WPX – The CW weekend saw those same horrible condx from the FQP reappear right on schedule 27 days later. I joined K5KG and NX4N, plus non-FCGer WI9WI, for a Multi-2 as J7A on the beautiful island of Dominica. Out of over 5000 contest QSOs, we had exactly 5 Japanese contacts, illustrating the poor condx vividly. We had been working JAs consistently in the morning on 20M during the week prior. OTOH, the SSB weekend 2 months earlier was apparently spectacular, with records falling like rain!

Results from ARRL DX CW show an amazing 58 entries from FCG members! We should easily have over 100 total entries once the SSB results are posted in the next few days.

WRTC-2014 activities have kept me pretty busy.

Remember that we in FL no longer have to compete with W1 for a Team Leader spot since we are in the "NA4W" Selection Area, placing us in a geographical area with only GA, AL, TN and KY. So if you have any aspirations of qualifying to compete at WRTC-2014, I believe that this is your best shot ever. There are a \*lot\* of events and categories to pick from that all could lead to a seat at the big table.

### Charles (Jim) Roux W4YA SK

Obituary by Dale Strieter W4QM

Born: 9 July 1936 Died: 28 Jan 2011

I first came across Jim in the early 1950's when he was living in Pennsylvania using the call sign W3ROU. I thought that was



a neat call sign as I was a member of the "Radio Officers Union" sailing in the summers to earn money. This so I could attend college to study Electrical Engineering in Michigan. It wasn't until a few QSO's later that I learned his surname was Roux. He maintained that he did not do a thing to get "ROU" but obviously the FCC individual handling the call signs saw the chance to do a good deed and issued the call sign to him.

It was several years later when I was employed with GE on the missile guidance system for the Atlas and Titan that we met in person. He was employed with Lockheed with their missile program and was living one mile north of me on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor of a 3 story apartment building located with beach frontage on the Atlantic Ocean. He was able to get permission from the owners to install antennas on the roof and I was able to assist him in installing 15 feet of Rohn 25 tower in the middle of the roof with anchor bolts drilled in the cement roo for the 3 guy wires supporting the tower. The tower supported a HyGain TH6 tri-band beam and we were able to have a wire antenna from the tower's top to the edges of the roof. This was fed with open wire feed line matched with an ATU. It played superbly well and I had the same beam but or a 50 foot tower 4 blocks from the ocean. When in the same DX pile up, he would beat me out most of the time and on the low bands, the wire was a superb antenna for 40 and 80. We became fast friends with his family consisting of a lovely wife (Jerry) and a very small daughter (Cathy). His call was K4THA (FOC 1088).

A few years later Lockheed lost some contracts and Jim was one of many that were laid off. He moved over to the west coast of Florida to work for Sperry Rand Corp. and became a member of the Golden Triangle DX Club which had N4OO, W4ETO (Alpha Co.), W4WS, AA4Z as members. Paul/W4MJ and myself would drive over and help out in their multi-multi contest operations which was always good fun.

Jim went though some tragic times losing his wife (Jerry) to an incurable disease (1989). He was devastated of course. He gave up on ham radio completely. Jim has a daughter (Cathy) that I believe is living up north.

Later he moved to Orlando FL area and took a job with Fluke Co. as a Sales Engineer. He stayed with them until he retired While there, he met and wedded Sherry. It was a happy time for him and he came back into Ham Radio which he had given up for quite a few years.

He had a multi-band vertical but never the less, he only had BS7H (Scarsborough), BV9P (Pratas), and P5 (N. Korea) left to work for a clean sweep of DX. A very good operator to do so well with such a simple set up.

When he gave up ham radio, he asked me if I wanted his National NCL2000 amplifier. I already had one but I readily accepted as we needed a good amp out in VQ9 (Diego Garcia). I modified and updated the amp and it served us well. When MWR (Morale, Welfare, Recreation) had so much money in their account that it could not be readily spent (due to doubling the price of alcoholic drinks and tobacco in an attempt to cut down on their usage), they asked the Radio Club if we could help them out! What a change as before, we had received not one penny and the members had to chip in or bring out their personal ham gear to operate. Among computers, LP antenna and three transceivers we also got 3 brand new MFJ amplifiers. This made the NCL2000 surplus to our needs and I brought the amp back home. By this time, Jim was back on the air with a 100 watt transceiver so the amp was put to good use by Jim chasing DX. When I inherited an Alpha 87A amplifier (W4AI), I asked Jim if he wanted another one just as a spare unit. By this time those amps were probably 50 years old and spare parts were rare so he thought it was an excellent idea.

I dearly miss my good friend Jim. Always a gentleman and never asking for pity for the way he had been dealt the hard blows while in his middle years.

Even when he was diagnosed with cancer in both lungs, he hung in there with no complaints and as pleasant as he could be. Chemo really caused him to be fatigued most of the time and I recall him saying that "I am tired of being tired" and that was the only complaint we heard about his cancer.

I hope I can have his attitude on what hard knocks life may have for me in the future.

Sherry had a memorial for Jim at their house with family Jan 30<sup>th</sup>.

# Leo Meyerson W0GFQ SK


Leo Meyerson, W0GFQ, of Omaha, Nebraska, passed away on Wednesday, April 13. He was 100. In 1935, Meyerson, an ARRL Life Member, founded Wholesale Radio Laboratories -- the forerunner to World Radio Labs -- in Council Bluffs, Iowa. For his contributions to Amateur Radio, Meyerson was named the 1997 Ham of the Year at the Dayton Hamvention.

Tom had a great sense of humor. In an e-mail from the FCG reflector archives on April 5, 2010 he wrote: "Got my FQP certificate today - #1 SSB only, USA - or was I the only one in that category? Sometimes I feel like the Maytag repairman..."

Tom graduated from the University of Southern Mississippi in 1970 with a Master of Library Science degree. He also studied Art Education there.

He worked for 22 years at Eckerd Youth Alternatives, a High Risk Juvenile Correctional Facility for Boys in Okeechobee FL, leaving there in 2008 to move to Clinton TN. Prior to that he spent 6 years as Language Laboratory and Media Center Manager at the University of Southern Mississippi in Hattiesburg MS. He spent 4 years in the United States Air force as an Aircraft Avionics Technician, leaving in 1974 as a Staff Sergeant.

After Hurricane Jeanne in 2004 I got power for a few minutes, enough to get on the reflector and sum up the damage and note that I was still looking for a generator. A few days later I found one. As I was hooking it up, Tom drove into the yard with a generator on his truck. Looks like I'm a little late" he said, " but I'm glad you are finally getting power."

That was Tom, always willing to help.

## The Lost Art of Cable Lacing

The Make: magazine blog is a wealth of information for amateur radio operators. The blog post does a great job of explaining the technique and includes several illustrations. Nowadays, we mostly use zip ties to bundle cables, but there are disadvantages to using them. For one thing, to apply them properly, you should have a tool that controls how tightly the zip tie holds the wires. This is to prevent crushing the insulation.

Also, I've found that zip ties don't do so well when the cable has only two or three wires. They're just not designed to hold so few wires. I think that cable lacing would do a much better job of keeping a small bundle of wires together, say wires that connect front panel components to a PC board.

Cable lacing certainly looks much cooler than zip ties. This is the perfect technique for those homebrewers that want to make their projects look great as well as work great.

I asked on my blog, "Now, where can I find the 'wax-impregnated cotton or twine'?" and my readers came through.

Hamilton said, "Apparently you find wax string here: http://

Ned, WB4KBO, said, "I would suggest a large roll of dental tape and a large-diameter curves sewing needle for fabricating harnesses. I was told that this was the material of choice for lacing harnesses when i worked at Heath Company many years ago. Makes sense to me. Buy it at Meijer for an occasional harness, or a dental wholesale supply house if you are going into production. Also great stuff for kite rigging, vine lacing and many other things."

Mike, WA6ARA wrote, "What you want is Mil-T-43435. It is better than a cord, it is a flat weave tape, nylon, and waxed. It is made for cable lacing but is use now in the parachute industry as "super tack". Item T1050 at http://www.paragear.com"

So, there you have it. Links to show you how to do it, and a couple more links for where to find the lacing material. I now expect all of our homebrew to look a lot neater.

## Orlando Contest Dinner and Supersuite - 2011

The 2011 Florida Contest Group Contest Dinner and SuperSuite was again a great success, thanks to the support of the FCG membership as well as a number of guests who came in to Orlando from out of town. In summarizing the events of the weekend, let me first thank the club for sponsoring the event, and specifically let me thank K4LQ, K1TO, K5KG, K8NZ, and W4LT for their contributions above and beyond the call of duty.

In addition to club members contributing their time and effort, we could never have held the event without the kind assistance of our sponsors. Yaesu was again the primary sponsor of the event, and donated a brand new FT-950 as the grand prize in the raffle. In addition, K4ZA donated a copy of his new book, Antenna Towers for the Radio Amateur. K4AC donated a number of FCG-branded items from his business, Amateur Outfitters. The ARRL provided a number of NCJ subscriptions, in addition to a new edition of the ARRL Handbook and ON4UN's Low-Band DXing book, and K1TO donated a pair of gift certificates 50% off tower work from A1 Tower Service. CQ Communications also donated two one-year subscriptions to CQ Magazine. The prize list was long, so I will summarize the winners of the main prizes shortly.

Following dinner, NS3T gave a very well-received address that touched on ways that he uses his contesting background in his day job as a reporter for a number of talk radio stations around the country, in addition to his most prominent job as the Washington correspondent for the nationally-syndicated Neal Boortz Show. His description of how he steals time after his kids and wife go to bed to contest from his home station, which consists of wires in trees, is distressingly familiar to me as well as many other FCG members, I'm sure.

Perhaps the highlight of Jamie's speech was his summary of how he uses Writelog and recorded voice files to contest on SSB. He can do an entire SSB contest without touching his microphone, including sending the other station's callsign and all elements of the exchange. That sparked a lot of discussion from many of the cwonly ops in the room, some of whom avowed they might actually try to run in a phone contest if they didn't have to actually talk to do so.

Following Jamie's speech and a question and answer session for the crowd, many of those in attendance adjourned to W4LT's pileup simulator to try their hand at the SSB or the CW pileup tests. Let's extend a hearty congratulations to AD4Z/HI3A, who took first place in both phone and CW pileup competitions despite the presence of two nostrils (an inside joke which will become apparent if you read Julio's email signature). Other top finishers on CW include K9JF and K9LA, doing the black hole proud and ending up tied for second place. K5KG finished fourth, after ties, at decoding the dits and dahs. On SSB, following close behind AD4Z were phone contester extraordinaire K4XS and our guest speaker NS3T, who tied for second. Somewhat to the chagrin of the other phone contesters there, N6AR, who makes no secret of his preference for RTTY and CW (not necessarily in that order), came in fourth

Finally, the raffle (for which dinner tickets served as entry tickets) capped the excitement of the evening. The winners of the 50% off tower work certificates from K1TO were AA4HP and HI3CC, both of whom own large stations. Anyone who has had a station with more than one tower can well imagine how these multi-tower stations might benefit from some professional maintenance. The winner of the latest edition ARRL Handbook was W4LT, and the ON4UN Low-Band DXing book was taken home by new member K4GRD. Finally, all the tickets from all previous winners were put back into the barrel, and WH7YL, XYL of K4XS drew WA4FJK's ticket to take home the FT-950. Steve was visiting WF3C for the hamfest and was persuaded to come to the dinner when Chris promised to pay for his ticket. He left with the first radio he's owned since being licensed in 1976 that's still in production. He promised to make as many QSOs as possible with his new radio in FQP 2011 from his home near Raleigh, NC.

Thanks again to the club members who came to Orlando and supported the FCG Contest Dinner and SuperSuite 2011. We will do the event again in 2012, so mark your calendars for Friday, February 10 2012, and plan to attend the Dayton of the Southeast.

Dan began the meeting by noting that today was the 7<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the death of our club founder, Jim White K4OJ. He also noted the death of Jim Roux W4YA, who passed away



just a few weeks ago. Jim had been responsible for coordinating the use of the Golden Corral for our Orlando meetings each year. Hank K8DD who had attended many previous meetings on his way to a DX location for the upcoming ARRL DX CW Contest also passed away since our last Orlando meeting. Dan then asked attendees to identify themselves and to let everyone know their contest plans for the spring.

Attending were AD4ES, AD4Z/HI3A, AF4Z, HI3CC, K1KNQ, K1PT, K1TO, K4LQ, K4MM, K4PB, K4PG, K4QD, K4XS & WH7YL, K5KG, K8NZ, K9ES, KD2JA, KE1F, KI2G, KL7MF, KT4Q, N4BP, N4EEB & Tracy, N4EK & KD4BRJ, N4GI, N4KM, N4LZ, N4PJ, N4WO, W1YL, W2TX, W3AZD & WB3ANE, W4DAS, W4EBA, W4KPG, W4LT & Linda, W4OV, W4TV, W4ZGR, WA4OAB, WC4E, WF3C and WJ9B, along with New Members Ronnie KD4ZZK and Levon KT4LST, plus visiting guests K9FN, W4PRO and Melinda (KJ4TYG?).

Fred K4LQ then gave the Secretary/Treasurer's report. Membership now stands at 264, the highest ever, with the addition of 3 new members —

KD4ZZK, KT4LST and W4SVO. Going into the Orlando function, 56 dues remain unpaid. Fred will attempt to wrap up dues collections by the end of February. Treasury contains \$6572.08. The W1CW/K4OJ Memorial Fund contains \$1266.07. The March newsletter will cover all of this year's Orlando FCG activities.

2010 FQP – Dan noted that there were over 900 logs, and over 100,000 QSOs. This puts us second only to the California QSO Party in size. He thanked Jeff WC4E for his work on the certificates and Eric K9ES for handling the plaques. Dan then handed out FQP plaques and certificates. Kevin K4PG took pictures of the awards being handed out.

FQP history - Dan asked if anyone knew the specifics of when the FQP stopped running before the FCG revived it starting in 1998. Some attendees recalled a few details and promised to look up what they could find in their archives, including back issues of Florida Skip and old certificates.

ARRL 10 Meter Contest – Dan waved the gavel that the FCG won for the ARRL 10 Meter Contest 2008 and noted that we expect to be receiving another one for this contest before long. FCG scored between 9 and 10 million points in December, as we benefited from some excellent propagation (finally!) and excellent participation levels from the club members.

Feedback on the first Annual FCG-sponsored Contest Dinner was terrific. Lu, W4LT announced that the results of the CW & SSB copying contests would be available later in the week. Chris, WF3C will write up a summary of the Dinner for the FCG.

Chris WF3C gave a brief summary of the workings of a CW Skimmer node. The Club is investigating the possibility of sponsoring and installing a node for club and general Florida use.

# NCDXF Announces Major Contribution from the Estate of John Beck W4AI

(From the NCDXF Web Page)

The Board of Directors is pleased and proud to announce that NCDXF has received a very substantial contribution from the estate of John Beck, W4AI. Mr. Beck passed away in February 2008 at the age of 89.

Mr. Beck was originally licensed as W6MHB in San Francisco, California. His first DXpedition took place in 1955 as TI9MHB, Cocos Island. Mr. Beck joined RCA in 1956 and was an engineer for many of the tracking stations in the Air Force Eastern Test Range. During this assignment, Mr. Beck operated as VP7BT, Bahamas; VQ9J, Seychelles; VP2A and VP2AAA, Antigua; and ZD8J, Ascension Island. Following his East Coast assignment, Mr. Beck worked for RCA in Alaska where he held the call KL7AI. Upon his retirement from RCA in 1992, Mr. Beck relocated to Florida where he held the call W4AI. Mr. Beck was an early member of the Northern California DX Club and the Florida Contest Group.

Mr. Beck was an avid DXer and contester. He had worked all but two countries, all on CW. In 1966 and 1967, Mr. Beck, signing ZD8J, was No. 1 in the world in the CQWW CW contest. Mr. Beck was most proud of the letters he received from contest sponsors praising the accuracy and quality of the contest logs he submitted. This, of course, was a long time before computers made logging and operating during a contest more or less automatic. Mr. Beck logged with a pencil and paper and then typed the logs for submission.

The contribution to NCDXF was made possible through the efforts of Mr. Beck's executor, Dale Strieter, W4QM. For the old-timers who may recognize this call, Mr. Strieter has quite a DXpedition resume: 1958 and 1969 Navassa Island; 1961 and 1969 HK0TU, Malpelo Island; 1962 HK0B, Baja Nuevo; 1962 KS4BF, Serrana Bank; 1965 CE0XA, San Felix; 1986-2001 VQ9QM, Diego Garcia; and a number of Caribbean contest DXpeditions.

The Board expresses its sincere appreciation to Mr. Strieter for making this contribution possible.




