From the Editor's Corner

As most of you know by now, FCG lost one of its biggest contributing members when Vic N4TO passed away on August 15. Dan wrote the obituary for Vic which appears on page 4 to lead off our five page memorial section. This write-up also appeared in the FOC magazine "Focus" as well as on a number of reflectors on the internet.

Thanks to the FCGers who helped us move out about 60 percent of Vic's radio related estate at the Melbourne Hamfest

Dan, myself, and Terry N4TB finished our 8th day of work in the N4TO antenna field yesterday and are making good progress in removing Vic's antennas from the towers and taking the towers down. George K5KG, Ron K8NZ and Gary N4DL also lent a hand in the operation Antennas, towers and related switching devices will be appearing for sale over the next several weeks on the FCG reflector.

Dan is currently working out an M2 operation from his home for CQWW Phone to honor N4TO. It will feature many of the operators who operated M/2 and M/M at N4TO's over the past 10 years or so. The call is expected to be N4T.

Julio AD4Z has applied for the call HI3TO, to be used in the upcoming CQWW CW Contest.

It seems hard to believe that with this issue I will be completing nearly 9 years with FCG, as your Secretary, Treasurer and Newsletter Publisher. Those jobs have become a bit busier over the years, as our membership has grown from about 60 when I started to its current figure of 228.

Prior to sending in their application, potential new members often review the information about the Club on our website, then e-mail me with questions .

One of the more frequently received questions runs along the following lines ... "I'm a Dxer not a contester by prior experience. What does the FCG have to offer someone with my background?"

It is a question that is easy to answer, because to no one's surprise, I am not a contester by background, but have spent a substantial part of my 57 licensed years chasing DX and various awards.

Although I worked many contests in the years prior to joining FCG, a large part of what I have learned about contesting occurred during the time since I joined the club.

As an aside, I also have improved my own Dxing totals since joining FCG. Stay tuned for an article next issue entitled "Ten Band DXCC The Easy Way - Through Contesting" by your publisher.

Potential members also ask "I'm glad to hear I can increase my DXCC band totals as an FCG contester, but how can FCG help me to learn more about contesting?" Here is what I tell them:

"First of all, FCG gives you the opportunity to work with and learn from some of the measurably finest contest operators in the world. You have come to the right spot."

"We have members with lots of CW, SSB and RTTY contesting experience, so whatever mode interests you, there is someone here to help you get underway."

"As a bonus, coming up on the FCG reflector gives you access to the combined knowledge of 228 members. In that group we have people who are very well informed in nearly all aspects of ham radio."

"While a lot of the chat on the reflector is about contesting, I have had occasion to make folders and save discussions on topics such as antennas, radios, lightning protection, grounding, mobile installations, line noise problems etc."

"In addition, FCG has a more formalized program called the Contest Buddy Program. It helps members over a wide range of areas, including contest strategies, station design, antennas, towers, software, computers and rig control and propagation and is accessible from the website http://www.letchforddesign.com/elmer/index.htm."

K1TO comments on CQWW RTTY Contest Results

Results of the Club Competition show us beating the FRC and many other prominent US clubs, finishing behind only the No Cal CC, YCCC and PVRC within the USA. 4 DX clubs also finished ahead of us, so we were #8 in the world, with just over 6 million pts total!

Thanks to all who contributed to that effort! (The results are not grouped by call area and I'm not going to comb the full listing to pull out the FCGers!)

K1TO comments on ARRL 10 Meter Contest Results

The ARRL has released the results of the 2007 10-Meter Contest. As many will recall, this was dominated by the Texans, so it's not surprising what happened in the Club Competition:

"The most competitive club competition category in 2007 was the Medium Club category. 33 clubs qualified for this category, and three broke 1,000,000 points. Winning the club competition for the first time was the Central Texas DX and Contest Club. The 19 logs from CTDXCC members combined for 2,021,354 points, over 106,000 points per log on average. The CTDXCC's club score even exceeded the only club score in the Unlimited category this year. The Florida Contest Group came in second place, with exactly 50 logs (the limit for the Medium category) and 1,509,834 points. The Society of Midwest Contesters came in third place with 1,103,248 points from 31 logs.

The only club to motivate over 50 members to send in entries on its behalf this year was the Potomac Valley Radio Club. 76 logs from PVRC members combined for 1,725,518 points and a solid victory."

So, for the 2nd year in a row, the FCG is gavel-less in the 10-Meter Contest at a time in the sunspot cycle when you would expect us to do well! I think this is purely a reflection (so to speak) of propagation and not of the club's collective effort. Clearly, condx just plain stunk for us in December. I'm quite sure that this was the first ARRL 10 Contest since I've been here in FL (1996) in which a station from FL did not win a single category!

We're only a few weeks away from this year's 10-M Contest already! My hunch is that propagation might favor us dramatically this year.

N4TO IS A SILENT KEY

adly, Vic, N4TO passed away August 15th at the age of 65 of apparent heart failure at home.

Vic will be deeply missed by the contesting, DXing and FOC communities. He was also the President of the local chapter of his motorcycle club, a hobby he took up less than 10 years ago.

His central Florida station was very well equipped, with 4-stacks on 10 and 15 and 2-stacks on 20 & 40. His 80M 4-square was damaged by a hurricane a few years ago and not replaced.

Vic hosted numerous multi-ops over the past 10 years as well, including two Multi-Multi efforts for CQWW SSB, several M/2 for ARRL SSB, many Multi-Singles for ARRL 10 and even a 2-station M/S effort for SS CW. The cumulative list of operators that Vic hosted is quite formidable.

Vic and I operated 4 Florida QSO Parties using his mobile setup. We almost broke 3000 QSOs a few years ago, using hand keying and logging, and with a chirpy signal to boot.

I had the privilege of being on three successful, recordsetting CQ WW CW contest-peditions with Vic in the last 10 years. We went with K4BAI to 8P in 1999 and PJ4 in 2006, then with AD4Z, N4GI and K8NZ to HI3 in 2007.

Vic also went away for SS CW in 1982, operating from Pedro, NP4A's place and finishing 2nd overall, I believe.

Vic had a large hand in increasing the Florida Contest Group membership rolls. In the late 1990s, there was a splinter group formed called the Florida Contest Club, of which Vic was a member. He hosted annual summer picnics, later dubbed the Vicnic, and bridged the gap between the clubs by inviting several of us FCGers to his picnic Subsequently the Vicnics grew and grew. We had almost 100 attendees at the final Vicnic in the summer of 2005.

Several of us re-installed Vic's 20-Meter stack in April 2007. Vic's stated goal was to work Scarborough for his last all-time new one and to regain Top of the Honor Roll status. However, he missed it by being out to breakfast when the best opening to FL occurred.

Vic was a long-time member of the FOC and traveled often to England to attend FOC functions. He stayed with G4BUE and M0BUE on these visits and used the trips as an opportunity to visit many other FOCers Dxers and Contesters in different parts of England and Scotland.

There are many examples of Vic's kindness. I recall reading about one South Florida Dxer many years ago who needed an amplifier to work a new one. Vic carted his amplifier over to that fellow's QTH just so he could make the QSO. Vic helped me on countless occasions with last-minute equipment and tower ground help, despite living more than an hour away.

After many of the tower work days at his QTH, we would go to the local "Watering Hole" restaurant and chow down on fantastic "Cowboy" steak, the best I've eaten anywhere, He fondly recalled rubbing elbows with Paul Newman who raced at the nearby Sebring Raceway and loved the same restaurant.

Vic volunteered at the Sebring races, yet another of his contributions.

He loved his Miami Dolphins and Univ. of Miami Hurricanes football and was glued to the lounger on Saturdays and Sundays during football season.

Vic and I shared a love for baseball as well and attended a wide variety of games over the years. We were actively planning our next visit to see the Marlins this year.

He loved to tell the story of facing a young Steve Carlton while both were in the Miami school system. We attended and thoroughly enjoyed a Dominican Winter League game last November, courtesy of host HI3CCP.

Vic had triple-bypass surgery 2.5 years ago and had other chronic health challenges, yet he persevered and made the most of it. Vic leaves a sister and brother-in-law in Miami, and a brother in HP. Vic was born in the Panama Canal Zone and served as an officer in the US Coast Guard. He retired to Sebring in 1991 after a career in financial services.

Rest in peace, dear friend.

Could it be subjecting her to the indignity of being a "rig support" at our wedding had something to do with it?






